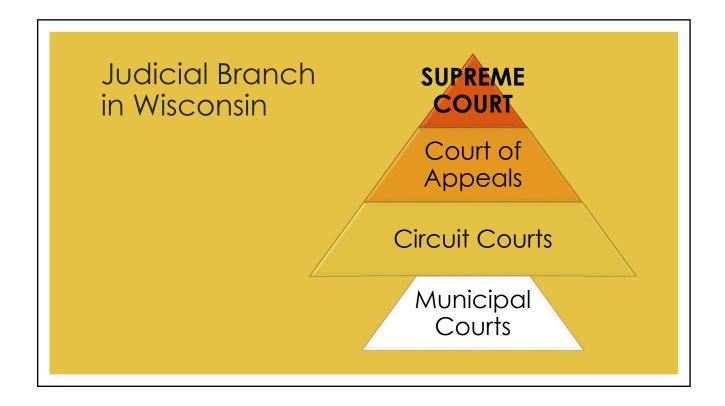
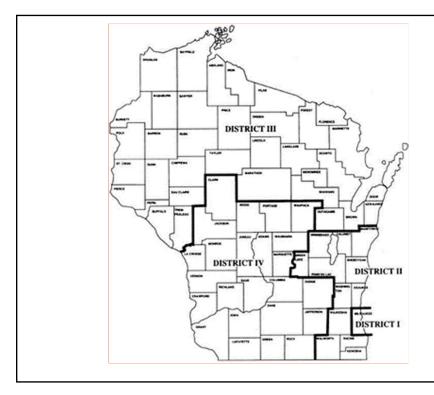

- Only 1 elected in any year

## Case Types

## Other 'differences'

- We have 1 filing fee
- 80% of our cases are started in a different court
- We REALLY like briefs
- We reject filings for deficiencies
- Clerk's office issues orders
- We publish orders
- Majority of our cases are not confidential & are online
  - even if they are confidential in the Circuit Court





### An Appeal

A case in which a party asks a higher court (the appellate court) to review a trial court's decision.

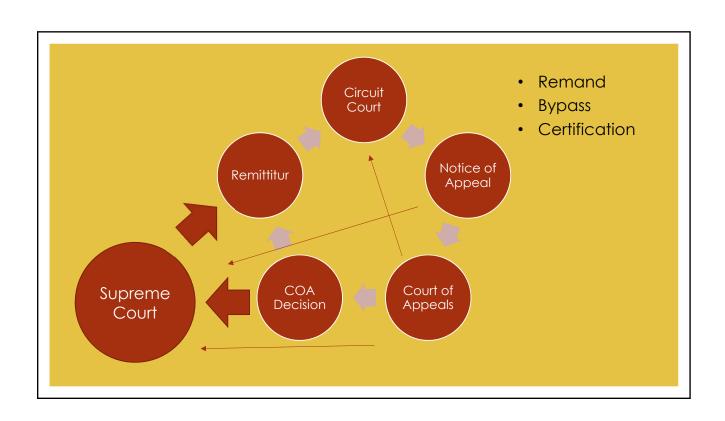
## Starting an Appeal

### Receive

- Notice of Appeal (NOA)
- ∘ COA Filing Fee (\$195)
- CC Transmittal Fee (\$15)
- Docketing Statement (DDS)
- Motions (M3J, MCO)
- Statement on Transcript (SOT)

### TRANSMIT (in 3 Days)

- Notice of Appeal (NOA)
- Court Record Card/ Record Events (NAT)
  - No Transmittal Certificate ©
- COA Filing Fee (\$195)
- Docketing Statement (DDS)
- Motions (M3J, MCO)
- Statement on Transcript (SOT)





# "Normal" Appeals

"CRIMINAL" PROCEDURE §809.30

Criminal appeal procedures apply to felonies, mental commitments, misdemeanors, protective placements, and juvenile cases.

"CIVIL" PROCEDURE §809.10

Civil appeal procedures apply to civil cases, small claims, family/paternity, probate, guardianship, adoption, criminal appeals by the State (974.05), and some postconviction motions (974.06, sentence modification).

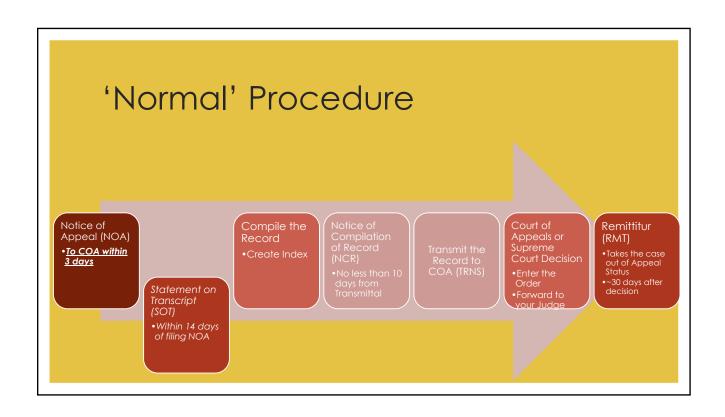

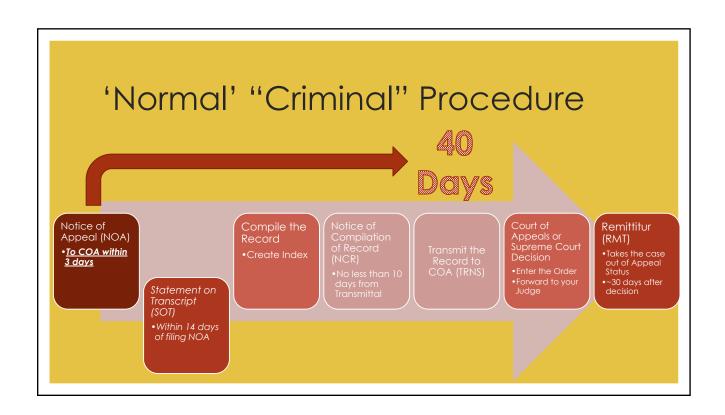

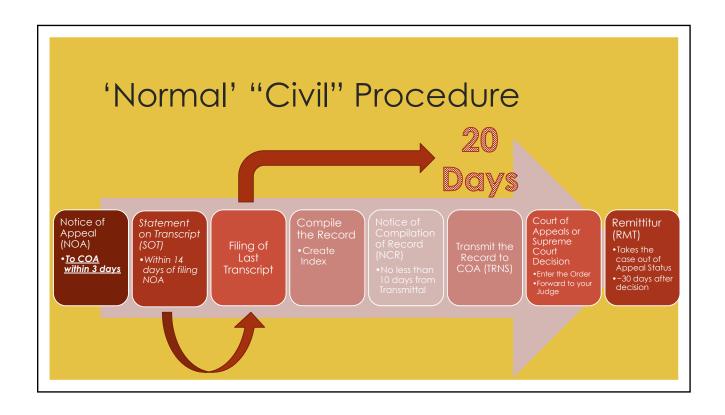
Transmittal 40 days after the Notice of Appeal

Transmittal 20 days after the filing of the last transcript



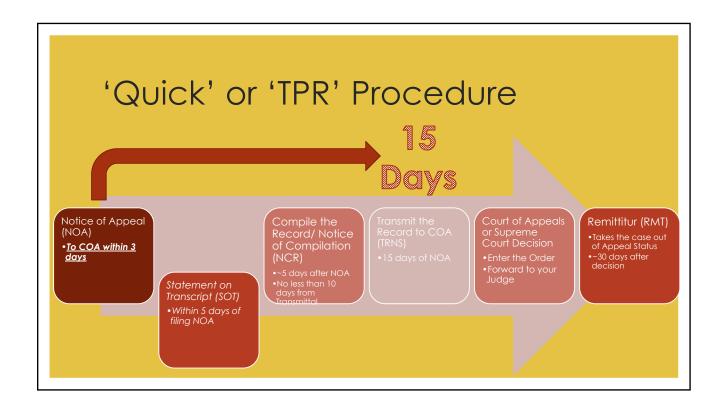

# Parents' Access to file after Disposition of TPR Case

- No <u>right to view</u> file:
  - s. 48.02(13) indicates a parent whose rights have been terminated does not meet the definition of "parent"
  - s. 48.43(2) states that a TPR order "permanently severs all legal rights and duties" between the parent and child
- No <u>right to receive notice</u> of or participate in post-TPR activities:
  - permanency planning
  - changes in address
  - changes in placement
- Parents DO have a right to receive information related to an appeal

# Parents' Access to file after Disposition of TPR Case

- Consider waiting a short period of time before removing the parent as a party to allow for:
  - the TPR order to be filed
  - the attorneys to submit bills
  - the parent or parent's attorney to file any Notice of Intent to Pursue Postdisposition or Appellate Relief (Form CA-100), which must be filed within thirty (30 days) of the TPR order
- 30 day waiting period corresponds to the due date for filing the Notice of Intent

### Appeals - Attorney Access to File after TPR

- When the parent is removed as a party the attorney is also removed
- The parent's trial attorney can still eFile the Notice of Intent to Pursue Postdisposition or Appellate Relief as a non-party filer after the parent is withdrawn as a party

# Entering Appellate Attorney as "Other" Party

- No "Attorney" or "Appellate Attorney," party type in CCAP
- Use "Other" party for appellate attorney to view the file
  - "Other" party grants access to all of the court records filed up to, and including, the TPR order
  - access should not be open-ended (your time limits are discretionary)
- Documents filed after TPR order (e.g., permanency plans) should not available for viewing – mark as confidential
- No way to restrict access to the <u>court record events</u>
  - Handwrite minutes (i.e. Permanency Hearing) & scan them in and mark the document as confidential and restrict access to that document

# Transmitting the Notice of Appeal for permissive appeals

### Receive

 Order Granting Leave for Permission to Appeals (OGLPA\*)

### Transmit within 3 Days

- Order from the Court of Appeals
- Court Record Card/ Record Events (NAT)



## Creating the 'Record's Index'

The Case: is all of the documents filed with the circuit court.

The Record: is the substantive documents filed with the circuit court.

The Index: is the list of the documents of the Record.

## Record (substantive documents)

#### **INCLUDES**

- Documents that commenced the action
- Proof of service
- Answer or responsive pleadings
- Motions/Briefs/Affidavits
- Jury Instructions
- Verdict, or findings of the court, and order/ Final Judgment
- Orders relevant to the appeal
- Exhibits
- Other documents requested by the parties
- Transcripts (at the end of the index)

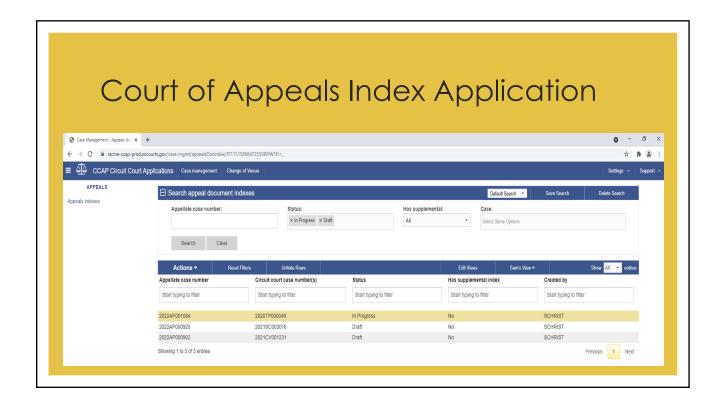

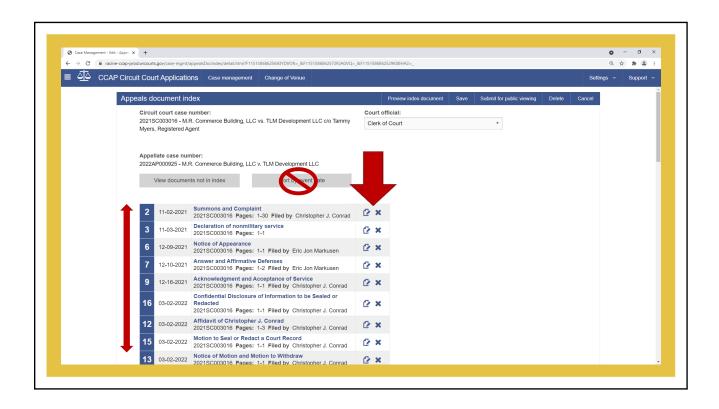
- Notice of Hearings
- Electronic filing notices
  - Miscellaneous
- correspondence (ie. cover
  - letters

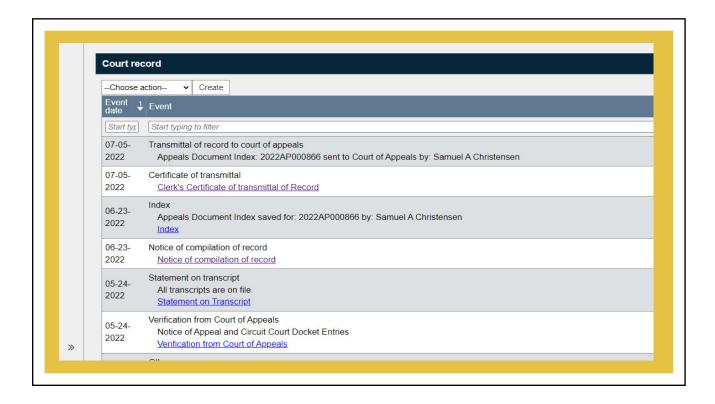
### **Exhibits**

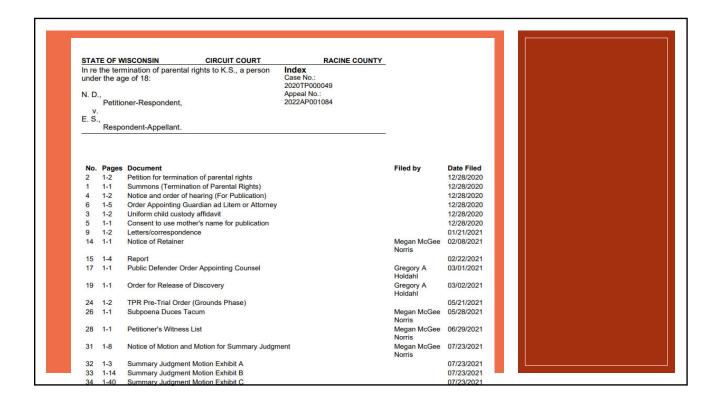
- Physical exhibits (flash drives, CDs, etc) that are going to be sent to the COA need to listed on the Index
  - May need a 'placeholder' scanned into the case
- Do not include large physical or unusual exhibits (poster boards, maps, clothing) without permission.
- NEVER forward exhibits with biological material, cash, contraband, or weapons!
- When possible send copies (flash drives, CD, etc.)











# Certificate of Transmittal (Clerk's Certificate)

- Sample in the Appellate Guide
- Certifies that you've compiled the record and that you're sending it.
- Also tells the Court what you're sending electronically and what you're sending physically in the mail
  - For example, exhibits (CD, thumb drives, etc)
  - Make sure the exhibits sent in the mail are on the Index (you may need to scan in 'placeholder' documents.



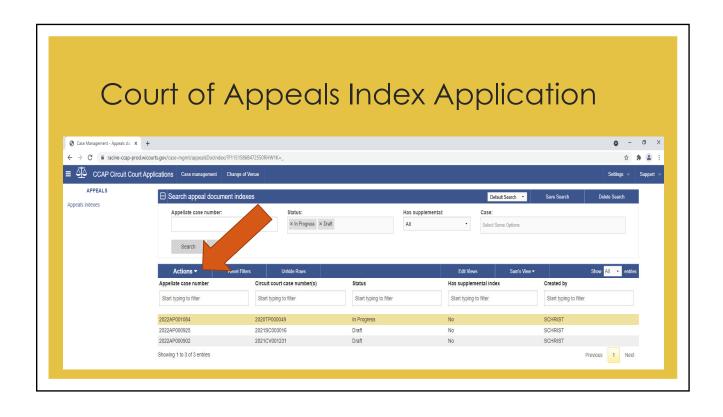
## Index - Corrections/Supplements

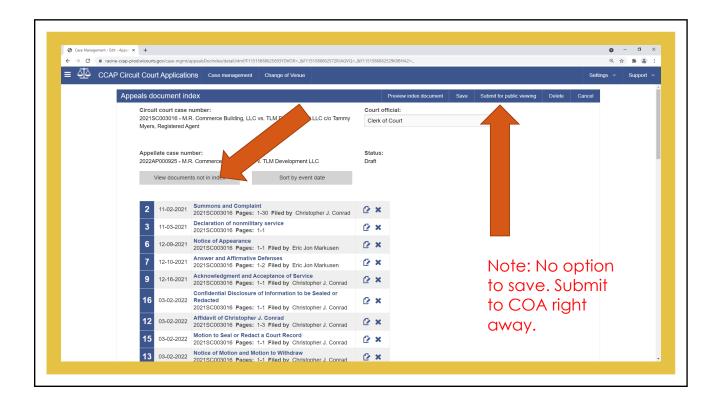
BEFORE SENDING RECORD TO COA

- Motion to Correct or Supplement the Record (in the Circuit Court)
  - If parties don't object, then make the correction.
  - If there is an objection, give it to the judge
- The circuit court must decide within 14 days or it is considered denied
- Send an Amended Index to all parties

AFTER SENDING RECORD TO COA

- Motion to Correct or Supplement the Record (to the Court of Appeals)
- COA will Issue an Order
- Circuit Court will create a Supplemental Return





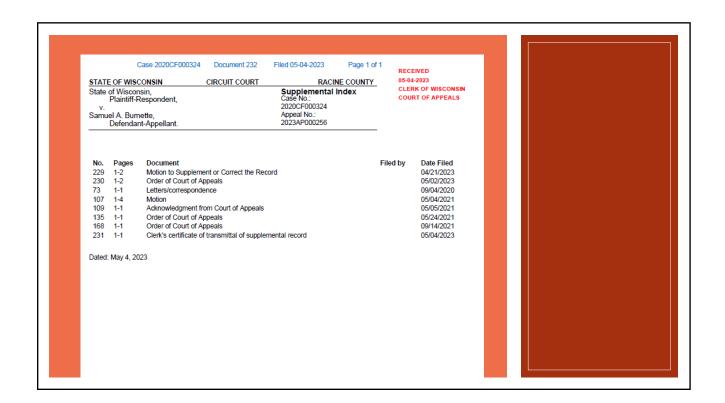
## Supplemental Index

- 1. Order to Supplement
- 2. Documents in order by filing date.
  - a) Documents with same date sorted by logical order (ex. Motion to Dismiss followed by Affidavit/Brief in Support of Motion)
  - b) Transcripts in order by date of hearing (not filed date)
    - a) Please include the hearing date in the document
    - b) For example: Transcript of hearing held June 12, 2019.
- Certificate of Transmittal (remember to include anything physically sent to the COA).

### Remember...

Do not refuse, reject, or return a Notice of Appeal even if the filing fee or transmittal fee is not included or paid.

- You can enter an assessment for the transmittal fee.
- The Court of Appeals will pursue payment of the filing fee.

When you receive a Statement on Transcript after the Notice of Appeal, transmit it to the Clerk of the Court of Appeals right away.

### Remember...

Please put transcripts in chronological order (by date of hearing) in the Index.
